COURSE DESCRIPTION

Through interaction and study, the student will become aware of the relationship and role expectations among the various agencies and the public. Emphasis will be placed upon professional image, and the development of positive relationships between members in the criminal justice system and public. Concepts of community-oriented policing as they apply to administration of justice issues, future trends, and training will be discussed.

COURSE OBJECTIVES (Student Learning Outcomes)

Students will be able to:

- 1. Compare past and present law enforcement methods within the community to show the need for police community relations training
- 2. Analyze and apply the issue of ethics and professionalism in law enforcement.
- 3. Examine changes in California demographics; relate the implications to those changes on public safety professions.
- 4. Explain the Role and Function of Law Enforcement in American Society.
- 5. Understand the concepts of the Community Oriented Policing philosophy.
- 6. Recognize the importance of developing intelligence through contacts and resources within the community.
- 7. Understand the importance of good public and community relations.
