COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course covers the origin, development, philosophy, and constitutional basis for evidence; constitutional and procedural considerations affecting arrest, search and seizure, kinds and degrees of evidence, and rules governing admissibility; judicial decisions interpreting individual rights and case studies.

COURSE OBJECTIVES (SLO's)

Students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the historical development and the constitutionality of the rules of evidence and how it ties into the Criminal Justice System.
- 2. Explain and identify the procedural rules and constitutionality of arrest and search and seizure.
- 3. Define hearsay, rules of admissibility, and understand the exceptions to the Hearsay Rule.

TESTS/EXAMS:

There are a total of seven (7) tests and one (1) comprehensive Final Examination in this course. Each of these tests will consist of a twenty-five (25) question test worth a total of fifty (50) points. Each test will have a time limit of 30 minutes, which means that class starts at 3:05 pm, class attendance is taken, then the test is handed out to the students. You will have 30 minutes, no longer. If you show up late to class, you will have what time is left to complete the test. There will be NO makeup test given. Failure to take an exam will result in a zero for that exam unless prior approval is given by the instructor. Bring a No. 2 Pencil and Scantron form to class on exam days for the test. **I DO NOT supply a Scantron or a Pencil for any exam**.

AS THERE IS NO RETAKES IN REAL LIFE - THERE WILL BE "NO MAKE UP EXAMS" GIVEN FOR THIS COURSE!

You must communicate to your instructor any problems that you are having with the course or anything affecting you in the performance of the course.
