Course Description and Objectives:

This course is a survey of American history from the end of Reconstruction (1877) to the present. This course will cover the major political, economic, social, gender, racial, cultural and intellectual transformations of the modern American eras. Of special note will be an examination of America's rise to global power. At the completion of this course students will have a broad understanding of the most important ideas, personalities, movements, and events in the modern period.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Identify and recall key information from a historical text and/or a documentary film.
- 2. Describe the causes and/or impact of a historical event and
- 3. Explain and analyze the significance of a historical text by the end of the course.

Teaching Methods:

Lectures, including material not covered in your readings, class discussions requiring your thoughtful participation, student oral presentations, and videos will supplement your required reading assignments. Both outside and in-class writing assignments are a component of this class. Students should <u>actively</u> read the textbooks, bring any questions you have about the material to class, and take careful notes in class. **Completing the assigned readings before you come to class will greatly increase your understanding and success in this class.**

Course Requirements:

Required Paper:

Point value 100 points

There will be one research paper required for this course. Each student is asked to write a 3-4 page paper that details your lineage. This is not a legal paper. What your or your heritage legal status is/was should not be discussed unless you feel it adds value to your thesis.

Complete details for this assignment will be made available during the second week of class.

Format of Research Paper:

- Printed copy to be submitted. <u>Bluebook is not required for this assignment</u>
- Typed- Double Spaced
- No more than 2 photos permitted.
- MLA Format
- 12 pt. Font
- Work Cited page is required for all papers

Research paper must be submitted via Blackboard on or before the date indicated on the Course schedule. Late papers are subject to a 5 point reduction for each day late. No papers will be accepted 3 days after the due date listed on the Course Schedule.

Exams:

There will be 3 exams in this class. Each exam will be in combination of multiple choice and essay format. Each exam has a value of 100 points maximum. There are no make-up exams, unless you make arrangements with the instructor <u>BEFORE the exam.</u> Any uncoordinated, unexcused missed exam will result in a score of "0" for that exam. **Scantron sheets (green)**, **Bluebooks and a No. 2 pencil must be brought to each exam.** Exam supplies can be purchased in the college bookstore. The instructor will not have any extra Scantron sheets or Bluebooks for students who forget to come to class prepared. Do not wait until the last minute to buy your test supplies. Exams not completed on these two forms <u>will not</u> be accepted.

Quizzes:

Pop quizzes may be given based on lectures and reading assignments. There will be no advance warning of any Pop-Quizzes. They will be scheduled at the discretion of the instructor. They will be primarily multiple choice, true or false, and short essay in format. Each quiz is worth 10 points each. If you are not present in class the day of the Pop Quiz, no make-ups will be given. All Pop Quizzes will be presented on an extra-credit basis.

Other Assignments:

<u>Written Assignments:</u> **(Up to 100 points)** A variety of written assignments will be given throughout the semester based on the weekly readings, class discussions, or films shown in class. Some of these assignments will be done in class, others will be outside assignments. If you miss class, you might miss one of these assignments, and there are NO make-ups on these assignments. Each student can expect to complete about 7 to 10 pages of written work in this class. All written assignments require students to apply critical thinking skills and support their thesis. I want to hear your thoughts in each written assignment. Students who effectively support their thesis with their own thoughts and opinions will be successful in this class.

Attendance:
