COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory course dealing with all aspects of public safety communications. It will cover the techniques to effectively communicate facts, information, and ideas in a clear and logical manner for a variety of public safety systems reports, crime violations, incident reports, letters, memorandum, directives and administrative reports. Emphasis will be on criminal justice terminology, use of English, and organization of information. Students will gain practical experience in note taking, interviewing, report writing, and presentation of testimony in court.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the basics to Communication and Writing Skills, with an emphasis on criminal justice and public safety requirements.
- 2. Identify the importance of honesty and truthfulness in gathering information and documenting that information for possible future prosecution.
- 3. Recognize the importance of gathering information through Interviewing and Note-taking for inclusion in criminal reports and use in a court of law.
- 4. Identify and distinguish facts, information and statements into a logical and understandable format that fulfills the legal requirements of a lawful arrest and applicable procedures for both misdemeanor and felony arrests.
- 5. Compose and complete an accurate and articulate crime report, arrest report, and followup report.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to write a criminal investigative case file for possible prosecution.

Assignments will be given during each class for you to complete in allotted time. Assignments turned in late will receive a lower point value than assignments turned in on time.
