AJ 110 – Law Enforcement (Police) Community Relations – Code (CRN#) 20416 Tue & Thur; 1:30 – 2:55 pm; Bldg# 200 – Rm# 203

Course Description and Objectives

Through interaction and study, the student will become aware of the relationship and role expectations among the various agencies and the public. Emphasis will be placed upon professional image and the development of positive relationships between members in the criminal justice system and the public. Concepts of community-oriented policing as they apply to administration of justice issues, future trends, and training will be discussed.

Class Participation

Extra Credit may be awarded for active participation in course activities, group discussions, reading discussions or open discussions throughout the course.

- 3. Explain the importance of recruiting, identifying, screening and training qualified candidates prior to employment in the criminal justice system. (ILO2, ILO4)

Quizzes / Tests

There may be scheduled and unscheduled quizzes during the semester. It is important that you attend class on test dates, as there **will not** be any make-up on quizzes, absent extenuating circumstances. (See below). These quizzes comprise a part of your overall Final Grade. Quizzes may consist of multiple choices, True/False, fill in the blank or short essay questions and are worth a possible of 100 points each. The questions will be based on the required textbook reading, lectures, and multi-media presentations.

Examinations

This course includes a Mid-Term Exam and a comprehensive Final Exam that will cover the entire material in the textbook, lectures and other presentations made during the course. The Exams may consist of multiple choices, True/False, fill in the blanks, or short essay questions. Mid-Term and Final exams are each worth a possible 100 points.

Make Up Exams – Extenuating Circumstances

We understand that students may have a serious illness or personal situation making it impossible to take an Exam when scheduled. If you should need to miss an Exam, you must call or email the Instructor on the day of the Exam to notify that you will be absent. If you do not attempt to notify the Instructor prior to the scheduled exam, you will **not** be allowed to take a makeup Exam. Makeup Final Exams are allowed only in extreme and documented circumstances, with the Instructor's prior approval.

You will orally present a synopsis of the article in your own words and give your opinion as to how the article relates to Police Community Relations. You will turn in a 1-2 page, double-spaced, typed paper summarizing the article, with the article attached. These are the instructor's copy and will not be returned.

Grading / Evaluation Methodology

Your Final Grade is based on scores received on quizzes, extra credits earned, the News Article Presentation Assignment, your Group Research Project (if required), and your Mid-Term and Final Exam grades. The percentage of points accumulated vs. total points possible will result in the following Final Grade being awarded:
