Course Description: This course is designed to assist advanced ESL students in further developing reading skills and reading efficiency in English. Focus will be placed on understanding text structure and overall comprehension of a variety of texts. Further development of reading skills will also be emphasized.

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- Distinguish between main ideas and major/minor details in a reading based on word clues. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 2. Select approriate vocabulary based on the readings' context clues to aid in overall comprehension. (ILO2)
- 3. Indicate the part of speech of a word. (ILO2)
