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## **About the Class**

Required materials: please bring these materials with you to every class

- Spiral notebook (8 ½ x 11 size, wide-ruled lined paper)
- Lined paper (separate from spiral notebook)
- Pens: black or blue only for ALL writings (no pencil, no white out)
- Printed writings from Blackboard/internet or handouts given in class

## Recommended materials:

- MLA handbook or online MLA reference site (The OWL at Purdue University)
- College-level dictionary

**Attendance**: You are expected to attend every class. If you are unable to attend class for any reason, check the syllabus and ask for explanation of any missed work BEFORE the next class. You are expected to be prepared with the work even if you missed class. If you are involved in various IVC activities, which require you to miss class occasionally, it is considered an excused absence.

Should you feel the need to drop, it is *your* responsibility to do so by the drop deadline (Tuesday, July 15, 2014) and you'll receive a 'W' for the semester. I *can* drop you if you miss three classes in a row, but don't assume that I *will*. Should you drop after the deadline, you will receive the letter grade corresponding to the work completed for the class (either a 'D' or an 'F').

I start class on time. Walking into class late distracts the whole class, but more importantly, you will miss introductory information. If you arrive late, please DO NOT walk up to me to explain your tardiness, ask what to do, or turn in any assignments. Quietly find a seat and get involved in the class assignment quickly. Should you be confused about what is going on, at the appropriate time, you may ask a classmate or me.

**Essays**: You will be required to write two (2) essays, one of which is a mini-research paper. A rough draft for each paper is mandatory and will be revised and edited for final draft presentation. Due dates are noted on the schedule. If you do not turn in the rough draft, you receive a zero for that assignment and **cannot** turn it in late: rough drafts *are not* accepted as late work.

Each essay is **required** to be submitted online through Blackboard and a printed copy brought to class. The online paper is for me; the printed copies are to be used in class and/or will be handed back to you. Should you not submit an online paper, your grade will be affected.

**Class work/Homework**: We will have in-class essay writings, revision/editing workshops for your rough draft essays, and various assignments to prepare for the essays and the Common Essay exam. Most of these writings will count toward the essay rough and final drafts.

**Journals**: You are responsible for writing in a journal multiple times on a weekly basis; some, but not all, of these journals may be written in class. Journals will be checked and graded twice throughout the semester. Journal checks are noted in the schedule; should you miss a class on the day of the check, you are responsible for turning it in by the next class; otherwise, it will lose half credit.

**Final**: The final will be an in-class essay known as the Common Essay. Much of our in-class writing will prepare you for the final.

Late work/make-up work: Final draft essays may be turned in **for half credit** after the due date; once you receive a grade on a final draft, it **cannot** be made up for more points. Rough draft essays **are not** accepted late. Some of the in-class assignments may be made up, but you'll need to ask about them.

**Plagiarism/cheating**: Plagiarism is both deliberate and "accidental" use of someone else's work(s), whether it is copying and pasting, buying a paper online, or not having a Works cited page or using in-text citations. If you do not fully understand what may be considered as plagiarized, ASK. "I didn't know" is not an excuse. All the writing for the class should be your own. You may always ask for help, but no one should do the actual writing for you.

Cheating is not doing the work yourself, copying from students' papers (including students in other classes or previous students), having someone else write your paper, or any other kind of deception of passing off work that is not yours as your own.

Anyone caught cheating will receive a zero (0) on the assignment and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file. Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the course and/or disciplinary action. Please refer to the General School Catalog for more information on academic dishonesty or other misconduct.

**Cell phones/restroom use/disruptive students**: I ask for your respect and responsibility in these areas. Please make the effort to use the restroom and take care of any cell phone conversations before class. You may use phones for class purposes, but at any other time, your phones should remain out of sight and set to silent or turned off (NO VIBRATE). Should it appear that you are more interested in your phone than lecture or class work, or, should you disturb another student, I will ask you to leave the class.

Should any student become disruptive or interfere with other students in class, he or she will be asked to leave and meet with the Campus Disciplinary Officer before returning to class.
