Course Description

Concepts dealing with right angle trigonometry and applications, unit circle trigonometry, graphs of trigonometric functions, inverse trigonometric functions, trigonometric identities, solving triangles using the Laws of Sines and Cosines, and polar coordinates.

- 4. Solve triangles using the Law of Sines and Law of Cosines, including ambiguous cases.

5. Verify trigonometric identities, including sum and difference formulas, half-angle and powerreducing formulas.

- 6. Define and graph inverse trigonometric functions.
- 7. Solve trigonometric equations.
- 8. Graph polar and equations.
- 9. Solve application problems.
