Course Description

This course emphasizes the continued instruction and practice required for understanding and improving B/W film exposure and development procedures, and improving the student's B/W printing skills. It covers various techniques for enhancing B/W negative and print quality. B/W composition and visual communication skills are stressed, as are the understanding and use of light and lighting control, both in the studio and on location. Additional materials fee applies. (CSU, UC)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Student will demonstrate the ability to use compositional and visual communication techniques to enhance and improve the quality of their image making.
- 2. Student will demonstrate the ability to apply the principles and techniques of the b/w film exposure/development relationship to enhance and control the negative quality and contrast.
- 3. Student will demonstrate the ability to use advanced techniques such as dodging/burning and toning to enhance and control b/w print quality.
- 4. Student will demonstrate a working knowledge of the theories, principles and techniques of lighting and lighting control in natural and artificial light.
- 5. Student will demonstrate the ability to discuss the aesthetics of a black and white photograph in both a historical context and in light of contemporary concerns.

6. Student will demonstrate the ability to prepare a photographic print for exhibition using existing museum standards.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Required equipment: A functional camera that has manual adjustments of the aperture and shutter speeds. Either 35 mm or 120 mm is acceptable
