Course Description

A study of human development from conception to death, including genetics, conception, prenatal development, infancy, toddlerhood, pre-school years, middle childhood, adolescence, early adulthood, middle adulthood, later adulthood, and death. Theories and research of physical, cognitive, personality, and social development are examined, as well as attention to developmental problems. - 5. Describe the sequences of physical, social, and cognitive development across the lifespan, using the constructs and conceptual framework provided by psychological perspectives
- 6. Identify and describe the techniques and methods used by developmental psychologists to study human development
- 7. Identify and describe classic and contemporary theories and research in lifespan psychology
- 8. Describe the developing person at different periods of the lifespan
- 9. Identify possible causes or sources of developmental change and reasons for disturbances in the developmental process

Academic Honesty
