#### **Course Description**

An introduction to music literature with emphasis on listening experience. Students study the expressive materials of music and the major forms of music literature. Emphasis placed on the skills and understanding necessary for lifelong music listening experiences. (C-ID MUS 100) (CSU, UC) In addition, this class will also explore a unit on global music traditions.

### **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- use critical listening skills to discuss and critique a musical work. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
- identify all the instruments in an orchestra by their appearance and their sound. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4))
- The student will learn how identify the characteristics of a classical or jazz composition through repeated listenings.(ILO1, ILO2, ILO4))
- Student will know the names of the most important composers and their most significant compositions from each historical period. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
- discover global music traditions through the study of geography and cultural history of other countries

### **Course Objectives**

- historical survey of music's place in society since pre-history
- broad overview of composers and their works from each historical period
- assess student's development of critical listening skills through regular listening quizzes
- asses student's understanding of musical terms and concepts
- encourage students' patronage of the arts through concert attendance requirements
- broaden students exposure to global music traditions such as African, Indian, and Eastern European.

### **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

<u>Tests:</u> There are four tests planned for the semester, one for each major topic discussed. Each test will consist of two parts: critical listening skills and knowledge of terminology/facts/dates.

<u>Classroom Activities:</u> Students will complete written assignments to demonstrate comprehension of lecture material and corresponding audio examples

<u>Concert Attendance</u>: Students will attend 4 live music performances this semester; 1 orchestra, 1 vocal, and 1 concert band, 1 jazz band. For each performance a concert report form must be completed and submitted to the instructor, along with a program, ticket stub, or other verification of your attendance at each event.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

#### Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. - MUS 102 SPECIFIC REQUIREMENT: You are responsible for all worked assigned. Absence, under any circumstance, does not exempt your responsibility to complete all assigned coursework and proctored exams. If absent for any reason, you are solely responsible for acquiring assigned homework, or scheduling make-up quizzes or exams\* Please note make-up quizzes and exams are provided at the discretion of the instructor and intended for emergency situations only.

### **Classroom Etiquette**

- <u>Electronic Devices:</u> are encouraged if used for educational purposes only such as the following: Note-taking during lecture, researching relevant topics during lecture, recording lectures, class discussions and performances. **Do not use electronic devices for:** chatting between class members, personal email, personal social media, and personal research, or work assignments related to another class Simply put, if it is related to class this class and not a distraction to you or others, its OK.
  - NOTE: If at any time your usage is deemed a distraction or found to be used for personal reasons you will lose the privilege of accessing your device during class.
- <u>Food and Drink</u> are prohibited in all classrooms. THIS IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT. Musical equipment, whether acoustic or digital must be protected from moisture and debris. Exception: Water bottles with lids/caps are allowed at the desks during class or on stage during rehearsals and performances. NEVER set a water bottle (or any other food or beverage) near a Digital Audio Workstation (DAW) or on the acoustic piano. On occasion a reception with snacks will be allowed in designated areas only (lecture desks or stage, NEVER at a DAW)
- <u>Disruptive Students:</u> Students who disrupt or interfere with a class may be sent out of the room and told to meet with the Campus Disciplinary Officer before returning to continue with coursework. Disciplinary procedures will be followed as outlined in the <u>General Catalog</u>.
- <u>Children in the classroom:</u> Due to college rules and state laws, no one who is not enrolled in the class may attend, including children.

## **Online Netiquette**

- What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

### **Academic Honesty**

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- <u>Plagiarism</u> is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- <u>Cheating</u> is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
