Course Description

Introduction to the study of poetry, fiction and drama, with further practice in writing. (CSU, UC)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

• ENGL 110 or ENGL 101 with a grade of "C" or better

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Recognize the development of character in fiction. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 2. Identify and become familiar with some academically relevant texts within the literary canon representing a variety of cultures and backgrounds. (ILO5)
- 3. Identify symbolism within works of fiction, poetry, and drama. (ILO1, ILO2)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Study and identification of the characteristics of prose fiction including plot, character, theme, tone, point of view, symbol, irony, figurative language, and other literary terms.
- 2. Application of knowledge of the characteristics of prose fiction to analyze specific works which represent various periods, authors, and themes; formulation of text interpretations.
- 3. Study and identification of the characteristics of drama including plot, theme, conventions, characterizations, and other dramatic devices.
- 4. Application of knowledge of the characteristics of drama to analyze specific plays which represent various periods authors, and themes; formulation of text interpretations.
- 5. Study and identification of the characteristics of poetry, including form and structure of poems, prosody, imagery and other figurative language, ambiguity, denotation and connotation, symbols, and allegory.

- 6. Application of knowledge of the characteristics of poetry to analyze specific poems which represent various periods, authors, and these; formulation of text interpretations.
- 7. Recognition and application to fiction, drama, or poetry of methods of criticism such as Freudian, Jungian, sociological, historical, structural analysis, explications of text and personal responses.
- 8. Other activities as deemed appropriate by the instructor for individual classes to achieve course goals.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Fiction, Poetry, and Drama: The class will be divided into these 3 sections, approximately of equal time, and will focus on corresponding readings. Each section will have assignments and writings related to the content read and discussed. Note-taking while reading, short response writings, reflection writings, and various other types of writings are to be expected, culminating in a "final" essay to finish the particular area.

Discussions: Participation in in-class discussion is absolutely necessary. The particular reading(s) for a class must be read before coming to class, and there must be questions, comments, critique, etc. ready to bring to the discussion. Even if a reading is not fully understood, that's the point of the discussion: to clarify for understanding. Once discussed, then writings will be expected.

Late work: Any work that is not submitted on time must be discussed with me within the week of the original deadline. Not all assignments are valid for late credit; if an assignment is accepted late, it will be eligible for half credit. **Extra credit:** None.

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Attendance

• A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Classroom Etiquette

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

• Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.

• Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
