Course Description

A continuation of MUS 165, private lessons in a chosen performance medium at 4th semester college level. One section meeting per week on campus, in addition to private instruction. As required conditions, the student must: 1. Secure a teacher approved by the College. 2. Take a minimum of on 30 minute lesson per week. 3. Meet one hour of class per week on campus for performance as scheduled and turn in weekly lesson attendance form. (CSU) 4. Present Applied Solo Repertoire in 2 Concert Performances for Applied Music Students - one at Mid-Semester, and the other close to end-of-semester.

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Perform 4th semester college level pieces with correct pitches, rhythms, dynamics, and articulations. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)
- 2. Play twelve major and minor scales up and down in two octaves. (ILO2)

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to perform two 4th semester college level pieces with correct pitches.
- 2. Confirm the ability to perform two 4th semester college level pieces with correct rhythms.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to perform two 4th semester college level pieces with correct dynamics.
- 4. Show the ability to perform two 4th semester -college level pieces with correct articulations.
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to play twelve minor scales up and down in two octaves.
- 6. Present studied Applied Music Repertoire in 2 Concerts one at Mid-Semester, one at end-of-semester.

Two (2) hours of independent work done out of class per each hour of lecture or class work, or 3 hours lab practicum, or the equivalent per unit is expected.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of
