Course Description

A basic course in drawing from observation as an essential means of expression. The focus is on contour line drawing, mass and line gesture, and value structure in creating the illusion of form. Both dry and wet media are used. Additional materials fee applies. (CSU,UC)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Because this a beginning drawing class, there are no prerequisites.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Write a descriptive essay on a contemporary exhibition. (ILO1, ILO3, ILO5)
2. Identify and create types of line drawings: contour, gesture, blind contour, cross contour, hatched, cross hatched. (ILO2, IL03)

Assemble a final portfolio with all work created during the semester. (ILO2, ILO3)

Course Objectives

1. Demonstrate an understanding of the basic principles of linear perspective in showing space on a two-dimensional plane
2. Demonstrate proficiency using the techniques of contour line drawing, gesture drawing, and value structure drawing
3. Understand the principles of composition, proportion and texture
4. Master a number of dry drawing media to realistically render subjects from direct observation
5. Demonstrate knowledge about various drawing styles in art history and cultures
6. Verbally articulate ideas and processes in drawing
7. Develop expressive content through manipulation of line, form, value, and composition.

Textbooks & Other Resources or Links

Drawing from Observation by Brian Curtis ISBN 978-0-07-735627 This textbook is not required, but it is highly recommended.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Demonstration, discussion, problem solving exercises, still life and life drawing, one and two point perspective drawing, non-architectural means to create the illusion of depth of space on a 2D surface. Written assignments, audio-visual assisted instruction, will be the methods of instruction used in this course. Out of class assignments will include keeping a daily sketchbook, journal, with notes and sketches. These will be checked weekly to bi-weekly, and will be considered a part of your homework. Over the course 200-300 gesture, contour and other sketches, will be expected. If students show more complete work, less will be considered. Although this amount seem daunting, once you get in the habit of carrying your sketchbook with you, you will find drawing this many sketches is quite easy. Learn to take an advantage of time in between classes, waiting at a dentist's office, etc. can all become times filled with drawing experiences.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Letter grade only:

A= Outstanding achievement in drawing skills, knowledge of course content, punctuality in completing assignments, ability to communicate visually and verbally, with excellence. 90-100%

Attendance

Since there will be numerous demonstrations and irreplaceable classroom experiences, regular attendance will be highly beneficial to you, the student. If you work primarily from home, you will only experience your own triumphs, trials and errors, of your process. While in class, you gain knowledge from the other artists there. By observing their techniques, and working processes, you can glean invaluable methods, you may use on future projects.

If for some reason you are unable to attend a class, please email, text or call me, in order for me to fill you in as to what we will do, or have done during class.

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Academic Honesty
