COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

Preparation for ENGL 009. Provides developmental instruction approaching the college level in paragraph and short essay writing. (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable); **Prerequisites:** ESL 005 with a minimum grade of C or better or Score of 5008 on the English Composition placement test.

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop and use discovery techniques such as free-writing and clustering and apply these techniques to expository writing of paragraphs and essays.
- 2. Generate ideas based upon knowledge of concrete data and be able to express ideas effectively using a controlling idea or thesis statement.
- 3. Organize data necessary to support a thesis statement or controlling idea while studying and applying various rhetorical modes with emphasis on description, narration, and exemplification.
- 4. Demonstrate the use of critical thinking by identifying the main ideas and developing written responses to a variety of written texts.
- 5. Demonstrate clean and correct sentence patterns and work to eliminate sentence errors such as fragments, comma splices, and run-ons.
- 6. Produce writing in which meaning is unobscured by grammar or usage errors in punctuation, spelling, subject-verb agreement, verb tense, word choice, and word order.
- 7. Demonstrate an understanding of the writing process with special attention given to editing and proofreading.
- 8. Participate in a number of activities and areas of study as deemed appropriate by the instructor.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Generate essays with a clear thesis statement or controlling idea. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
- 2. Write essays showing support for a thesis statement or controlling idea. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
- 3. Construct complete sentences with few errors in sentence structure such as fragments, comma splices, run-on sentences. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)
- 4. Compose a multi-paragraph essay response to a reading. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4, ILO5)

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Quizzes (Reading Comprehension & Grammar)

• Quizzes will be based on concepts discussed in class (such as grammar) as well as readings that are assigned. Most quizzes, but not all, will be announced in advance. You cannot make up an in-class quiz if you are absent or late to class. At the end of the semester, I will drop your lowest quiz score for just one quiz. (The Cumulative Grammar Quiz at the end of the semester will not be dropped. Most quizzes will be administered during class, but some quizzes may also be administered over Blackboard. Quizzes assigned through Blackboard will be announced in advance.)

Classwork, Journals, and Homework

- Classwork refers to in-class writings or assignments, peer review worksheets, paragraphs, and practice essays. Homework refers to any assigned work (such as worksheets, paragraph drafts, grammar exercises, etc.) that is to be taken home and completed as well as exercises assigned from the textbook. Journals refers to journal writing prompts that may either be assigned as classwork or as homework.
- You must do your homework if you wish to do well in this class. Doing homework prepares you for the day's class, so I don't accept late homework.

Essays 1, 2, 3, 4 & 5:

- Students will be required to write five major essays (reading response, descriptive
 narration, exemplification, compare/contrast, and an argumentative essay).
 Bluebooks must be purchased for the in-class essays. Comments will be made on inclass essays. Make sure you do not miss class on these days because there are no
 make-ups!
- Outside-class essays will require outlines, rough drafts, and a final draft. I will make comments on outlines and rough drafts, but not on final drafts. If you do not turn in a completed final draft on the date that it is due, you will automatically fail that assignment. A copy of the final draft will also need to be submitted to Blackboard's plagiarism checker, Safe Assign.

Final Essay:

• The final will be an in-class essay based on what we have worked on throughout the semester.

POLICIES

Blackboard:

• Important documents and assignments will be posted regularly on Blackboard (BB). It is also important that you check your email and the Blackboard home page as I often send messages through BB. If you're absent or if you lose a document, go to BB! For certain assignments, you may also be required to submit or turn in your work through BB.

Attendance:

- Students are expected to attend every class session. Any student who misses the first class will be dropped. Students may be dropped at instructor discretion if they miss more than a week of class hours continuously. Please make arrangements with the instructor or a fellow student to keep up with all assignments in case you cannot attend a class session for any reason.
- The only <u>excused absence</u> is a medical emergency which must be documented by a doctor's note. Please do not schedule any kind of appointment during class time.
- Students who are late to class or leave before class is dismissed will lose participation points for that day. Students who have extenuating circumstances must speak to the instructor in order to make sure the situation is clearly understood.
- Should you miss any class, you are responsible for any and all assignments which are due upon your return, including any handouts there may have been during class. Also note that <u>late assignments will not be accepted</u>. You must make the effort to discuss any questions or concerns in advance of the due dates.

Plagiarism and Academic Dishonesty:

for work that is not written by you for this class is a serious academic violation, as is
cheating on exams, quizzes, or assignments. IVC expects honesty and integrity from all

<u>Academic Misconduct Policy</u>: Academic misconduct includes misconduct associated with the classroom, laboratory or clinical learning process. Some examples of academic misconduct are cheating and plagiarism.

 It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or
 agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials. Information
 gathered from the internet and not properly identified is also considered plagiarism.
- Any student found by a faculty member to have committed academic misconduct may be subject to sanctions as determined by the faculty member. Sanctions MAY include a warning, grade adjustment, and course failure. Consequences for plagiarism include a zero on the assignment and a referral to Sergio Lopez, Dean of Student Development and Campus Events.

Due Dates: PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

- Work is due *in class* at the beginning of class.
- Late or incomplete assignments cannot be made up. In-class work, including inclass essays and quizzes <u>cannot</u> be made up.
- For whatever reason, if you cannot attend class on the date an assignment is due, you should make arrangements to complete the assignment early, have someone bring it to class for you, and/or email it to me before class.

<u>Classroom Expectations:</u> The following list covers expectations for in-class behavior:
