Course Description

This accelerated class will prepare you for transfer-level English composition and associate-degree classes. It emphasizes and develops skills in critical reading and academic writing. Strongly recommended: participation in the writing placement (Accuplacer) process. *This is a web-enhanced class, which means that using Blackboard and submitting assignments online is required.*

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Compose a multi-paragraph essay that responds to a prompt and is structured around a controlling idea or thesis. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO5) Essay 3, 4, & 5
- 2. Compose a multi-paragraph essay with few errors in sentence structure such as fragments, comma splices, and run-on sentences. (ILO1, ILO2 Essay 3, 4, & 5
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of basic research strategies, including appropriate use and correct documentation of research materials. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4) Essay 4
- 4. Demonstrate critical thinking skills by analyzing and responding to a selected reading. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4, ILO5) Essay 5

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Apply discovery techniques in writing and interpreting readings.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of connotative meaning and figurative language in reading and writing.
- 3. Utilize pre-writing techniques to structure multi-paragraph essays around a controlling idea or thesis.
- 4. Write essays that demonstrate an understanding of various rhetorical modes including description, narration, comparison/contrast, and argumentation.
- 5. Recognize both general and academic audiences and tailor a written assignment to address a specific audience.
- 6. Support text interpretations with citations.
- 7. Demonstrate effective sentence construction and punctuation in a variety of sentence types.
- 8 Demonstrate control over subject-verb agreement and verb tense while avoiding fragments and run-ons.
- 9. Successfully demonstrate skills in areas designated by the instructor to be appropriate supplemental activities.

Access to Aplia© is included when you purchase a new copy of your text (11 Essentials of Effective Writing) from the bookstore. This is the cheapest way to get Aplia© and will provide you with a hard copy of the text, an electronic copy of the text, and Aplia©. The cost for the bundle is approximately 70.00. *You can use Aplia without purchasing the access code until 9/8//2013.

Attendance / Preparation / Participation

In English 10, subject matter and skills are introduced and practiced in class, so attendance, preparation and participation are mandatory. The more you are actively engaged in reading, writing and thinking, the more your reading and writing is going to improve. You are allowed to miss the equivalent of one week of school. This translates to 2 absences for a class that meets two times a week. If you exceed this number, you may be dropped from the class. Arriving late or leaving early will be considered a partial absence. Students not present for the first class will be dropped.

I expect you to come to class regularly and to come prepared, as many in-class activities are based on the reading and thinking activities you complete before you arrive. I will evaluate your preparation and participation by collecting and grading selected written assignments and by giving impromptu quizzes. If you are absent for a class meeting, you cannot make up the work completed in class.

Assignments / Quizzes / Final Exam

Because this class is web-enhanced, some of the assignments are submitted online, and some are submitted in class. You are responsible for asking any questions you have about the assignments and submitting them before the deadline. Aside from documented emergency situations, I will not grade late assignments.

The final exam for this course is in two parts. You will be writing a final, in-class essay (Departmental Final) to demonstrate your mastery of the targeted writing skills and also taking a multiple choice test.

Plagiarism, using someone else's writings, ideas and/or words and passing them off as your own, is a form of cheating and will result in an "F" on the assignment, test, or lab activity and a visit to the dean. If it is repeated, you will fail the course and can be expelled from the college. See student handbook for policy.
