What will we do in this class?

- 1) Read and discuss important works of literature, from all over the world, written from hundreds of years before Christ all the way to 1650 AD.
- 2) View audio-visual materials to support our understanding of the literature we're reading.
- 3) Focus on important new vocabulary that we encounter in the literature.
- 4) Prepare and give presentations on special aspects of the literature, authors, history and ways of life depicted in the literature.
- 5) Make comparisons between literary works, authors, time periods, traditions and social customs.
- 6) Take quizzes on all the above.

What do I have to get for this class?

Each of these items is required for each student. Unless otherwise specified, please bring them with you to every class:

- 1. Main text: Davis, et al. The Bedford Anthology of World Literature (in bookstore).
- 2. Scantrons: please get the kind with 50 questions per side. You will need at least 6, and possibly more.
- 3. An 8 ½ " x 11" spiral notebook or notebook section to be used only for this class.
- 4. Dark blue or black pens and a highlighting marker.
- 5. A folder to save all materials from this class.
- 6. You will need Internet access (outside of class) for some assignments and to access the course web log.

What are the rules?

None of these basic rules is negotiable. Let me know during the first week of class if you will have any problem following them. Please...

- 1. Speak only English in class. The "Class Activities" portion of your grade (20%) is hurt or helped by this requirement.
- 2. Do not translate for others. This practice is not a favor to anyone. For many students, our classroom is the only venue in which they have the opportunity to practice their English.
- 3. Stay on task. If you persistently distract from the learning of other students, you will be suspended and possibly dropped from the class with a grade of 'F.'
- 4. Report problems as soon as possible. Group and pair work is your opportunity to help and learn from each other an important study and work skill. If there are classmates who are not contributing or distracting others, please report them to me immediately. I will respect your confidentiality.
- 5. Don't cheat. Cheating on tests or homework will result in your being dropped from the class and/or given an 'F.'
- 6. Turn off phones and all other electronic devices before you enter the classroom. Cell phone use during class is not permitted, and can become a disciplinary matter.
- 7. Do not bring visitors, food or beverages (apart from bottled water) into the classroom, including before and after class.
- 8. Leave the room only in emergency! Please do not ask me to excuse you from the class unless it is an emergency. The California Education Code requires a minimum number of classroom minutes for each student. Excessive and/or lengthy disappearances can affect your class activities grade and even cause you to be dropped due to excessive absence.
- 9. If you must leave the room, please let me know before you go. You will be marked absent if I cannot find you and I do not know where you are.
- 10. Do not make appointments with counselors or other campus personnel during your class time. If you will be requesting athletic leave, please bring me a copy of your schedule of games at the beginning of the semester.
- 11. Be responsible for keeping track of: a) your class grades, b) the drop deadline, c) the information on these pages, and d) all assignments and information you missed due to absence.
- 12. If you do arrive late for any reason, you must tell me so at the end of the class. If you forget to do this, you may be marked absent.
- 13. Communicate your concerns. If you do not share your concerns, I may not be able to help you succeed. I respect and honor students who bring complaints to my attention, even if they have to do with me personally. I encourage the practice of "questioning authority" as a form of critical thinking, which is a skill we encourage at IVC.

DISCIPLINARY POLICY:

If I determine that your behavior in class is having a detrimental effect on the learning of other students, I will inform you of the problem. If the problem continues, I will ask you to leave the class. In that case, you will need to make an appointment to speak to the Dean of Students about the problem before returning to class. Disciplinary problems can also result in suspension, being dropped from class, or expulsion from the college.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Please note: No doctors note, excuse or explanation is required, but you may not make up quizzes or receive credit for homework missed when you are absent for any reason except a pre-approved athletic event.

0 absences:	Extra credit for class activities grade.
