Course Description: ESL 001 is a grammar class in an English-only environment designed for the beginning or false beginning ESL student. The course will cover grammar and simple sentence writing.

- 2. Demonstrate the skill of describing routines by selecting grammatically appropriate questions and statements (ISLO1).
- 3. Write correct forms of the verb+ ing using appropriate spelling rules (ISLO1).
- 4. Follow common classroom instructions (ISLO1).
- 5. Students will be able to recognize and select the subject of a statement or question by identifying the correct noun or pronoun (ISLO1, ISLO2).

Unwillingness to participate will result in deduction of points from your final grade. All in class assignments must be completed and turned in.
