Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Course Overview: This course covers art exhibits from start to finish providing the student with hands on experience, handling artwork, setting up an exhibit, meeting the public, and taking down exhibits. For those who may be considering a career in a gallery or museum setting, or those thinking about work in exhibition design.

There will be lecture/demonstration; in class critiques and discussion; audio-visual presentations; gallery and museum visitation; guest speakers. Hands on installing and de-installing art exhibitions, gallery sitting, meeting the public, learning about being a curator, and promoting exhibits.

<u>Out of Class Assignments</u>: Students are responsible for attending a minimum of three art exhibitions during the semester. Students should write a short and informal "review" of each exhibit, with attention to the installation of the exhibition as well as sharing and explaining opinions about artwork.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Grades are assessed on the following criteria:

Participation in gallery activities 60%

Classroom discussion 10%

Three Exhibition Reviews 10%

Personal response to assigned reading (three take home quizzes) 10%

Final Exam 10%

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class.
