Course Description

ESL 001 is a grammar class in an English-only environment designed for the beginning or false beginning ESL student. The course will cover grammar and simple sentence writing. (Formerly ENGL 091) (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Write sentences in English with correct subject/verb agreement.
- 2. Correctly form and use verbs in a variety of tenses.
- 3. Identify the part of speech of a word, phrase, or clause and use it correctly in a sentence.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of, and ability to use, correct punctuation and mechanics.
- 5. Write and/or identify a variety of sentences (simple, compound, complex, compound-complex), including questions and negatives.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to classify the following parts of speech: nouns, verbs, pronouns, adjectives, adverbs of frequency, and prepositions.
- 2. Demonstrate competency in creating affirmative and negative statements, yes/no questions, and wh-questions with the verb "be" and other verbs in the simple present, present progressive, and future (be going to), and the ability to do the same in the simple past; demonstrate competency in using the affirmative and negative imperative forms.
- 3. Demonstrate competency in using the modal "can" for ability.
- 4. Demonstrate competency in using singular and plural nouns including correct spelling and

appropriate possessive forms.

- 5. Demonstrate competency with the use of subject and object pronouns, and possessive adjectives.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, and produce adjectives in correct word order, as well as adverbs of frequency.
- 7. Demonstrate competency in using, recognizing, and producing 5 verb + gerund combinations, 5 verb+ infinit ive combinations and with 5 +infinitive or gerund comb inations.
- 8. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, and produce prepositions of time and location.
- 9. Demonstrate the ability to use and recognize the conjunctions and, but, and or.
- 10. Demonstrate competency using there is/ there are in affirmative, negative, and interrogative sentences, and with articles a/an.
- 11. Demonstrate the ability to use, produce, and recognize level appropriate vocabulary in a variety of oral, aural, and written exercises.
- 12. Write sentences demonstrating competency of the above-mentioned grammatical areas with correct capitalization and ending punctuation (period, question mark, and exclamation point).

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Classroom Etiquette

- <u>Electronic Devices</u>: Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class, unless otherwise directed by the instructor.

Online Netiquette

- What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- <u>Plagiarism</u> is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- <u>Cheating</u> is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file. Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the course and/or disciplinary action. Please refer to the <u>General Catalog</u> for more information on academic dishonesty or other misconduct.
