Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:



- Demonstrate Professional And Ethical Responsibilities.



Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course is part of the IVC Inside/Out College Program which brings "Inside" students (those incarcerated at the Imperial County Jail) and "Outside" students (IVC campus students) together for a unique and transformative learning experience. All class sessions, except for the first week orientation, will be held at the Imperial County Day Reporting Center (DRC) at 324 Applestill Road, El Centro, next to the Imperial County Probation Department. Orientation for "Outside" students will be on Thursday, August 20th, from 1:00pm-4:10pm at IVC in Room 203. Orientation for "Inside" students will be on Monday, August 17th, from 1:00pm-4:10pm at the DRC.

The course will consist of classroom lectures and activities in support of student learning. For more information regarding course requirements and Instructional Methods see the Class Schedule/Calendar at the end of the course syllabus.

<u>Out-of-Class Assignments</u>: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time <u>and</u> two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. Attendance
