Course Description

A course structured to correlate those musical skills, techniques and understandings which are basic to comprehensive keyboard musicianship at the early level of study.(CSU,UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Perform beginning level-1 pieces with correct pitches, rhythms, fingerings, hand position, at a reasonable tempo, with expressions indications observed. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
- 2. Perform the C major scale with the RH and the LH separately. Up and Down 2 Octaves. (ILO2, ILO4)

Course Objectives

Performance of the five-finger patterns for all major and minor keys with both the right and left hand.
Performance of the major and minor triads based on each of the twelve pitches with both the right and left hand.

3. Performance of the I V6/5 I triad progression in all major and minor keys with both the right and left hand. 4. Performance of the I IV6/4 I V6/5 I triad progression in all the major and minor keys with both the right and left hands.

5. Performance of the I V7 I chord progression in all major and minor keys (RH=I V6/5 I (close triads; LH=Chord Roots).

6. Performance of the I IV I V7 I chord progression in all major and minor keys (RH=I IV6/4 (close triads): LH=Chord Roots).

7. Accurate sight-reading of music of an appropriate skill level (five-finger pattern) at the keyboard.

8. Accurate sight-reading of music of an appropriate skill level (five-finger pattern). Imperial Valley College Course Syllabus – Course Title and number

9. Demonstration of a knowledge of the elements of music reading: pitch, duration (to sixteenth notes or rests), dynamics, tempo, and expression.

10. Accurate transposition of five-finger melodies and simple triadic harmonies.
