Course Description

A course designed to fulfill the California EMT I refresher course requirements. This course will review basic life support topics and procedures to include CPR training. Topics specific to Imperial County will be presented, as well as, changes in policies and procedures. Updated and new materials will be included. Successful completion of this course will satisfy continuing education requirements for the EMT I and will enable the EMT I to be eligible for recertification in the state of California. This course is approved by the Imperial County Emergency Medical Services Agency and is within the training guidelines of the California Code of Regulations and the California Fire Service Training and Education Systems (CFSTES). Same as Fire 105R (CSU).

II. A. PREREQUISITES, if any:

Current EMT-I certification, or have possessed an EMT-I certification within the past 4 years, and as mandated by the Imperial County EMS Agency, California Title 22, and/or CoAEMSP National Education Standards

Or You have passed the EMT course and are eligible to take the nremt cognitive exam.

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to: 1. Complete a trauma patient assessment and spinal immobilization on a supine patient in simulated setting. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO5) 2. Demonstrate proficiency in federal, state, and/or local regulations with regards to emergency care. (ILO2, ILO3)

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of CPR, airway and oxygen devices with an overall exam score of 80% or

higher and passage of a practical exam

- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of local policies and procedures with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of scene and patient assessment with an overall exam score of 80% or higher and passage of a practical exam
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of written and radio communication with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge of medical, environmental, and behavioral emergencies with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 6. Demonstrate knowledge of traumatic emergencies with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 7. Demonstrate knowledge of obstetrical emergencies with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 8. Demonstrate knowledge of pediatric emergencies with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 9. Demonstrate knowledge of geriatric emergencies with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 10. Demonstrate knowledge of multi-casualty scene management with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 11. Demonstrate knowledge of advanced life support interface with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 12. Demonstrate knowledge of EMS legalities with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 13. Demonstrate knowledge of patient and EMT stress, including recognition and coping mechanisms with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 14. Demonstrate knowledge of heparin/saline locks, nasogastric tubes, gastrostomy tubes, foley catheters, tracheostomies, and pre-existing vascular access devices with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 15. Demonstrate knowledge of basic anatomy, physiology, and medical terminology with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 16. Demonstrate knowledge of splinting, spinal immobilization, bandaging, and the pneumatic anti-shock garment with an overall exam score of 80% or higher and passage of a practical exam
- 17. Demonstrate knowledge of communicable diseases with an overall exam score of 80% or higher
- 18. Demonstrate knowledge of EMT-1 scope of practice with an overall exam of 80% or higher and passage of a practical exam
