Course Description

ESL 24 is a reading class designed to assist high-intermediate ESL students in developing reading skills and reading efficiency in English. Focus will be placed on understanding text structure and overall comprehension of a variety of texts. Further development of reading skills will also be developed. (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to: 1. Distinguish between main ideas and major/minor details in a reading. 2. Select appropriate vocabulary based on the readings' context clues to aid in overall comprehension. 3. Identify the correct definition of a vocabulary word using an English-only dictionary.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate competency in using reading skills such as skimming, scanning, vocabulary in context, making inferences, previewing and making predictions to aid in overall comprehension.
- 2. Demonstrate competency identifying topics of readings, main ideas (both implicit and explicit), and major/minor details.
- 3. Demonstrate ability to summarize short text and reading selections.
- 4. Identify text structures listing, time order, comparison/contrast, cause/effect, sequencing, problem/solution, extended definition—for the purpose of drawing a conclusion.
- 5. Demonstrate mastery in interpreting charts and graphs.
- 6. Demonstrate ability to choose a book of an appropriate level, read independently, and provide supporting documentation of such, such as a reading log and report.
- 7. Correctly use an English-only dictionary to locate and decode words, identify parts of speech and antonyms and synonyms in order to understand texts.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Homework: Please write your name, date, class code, and page number to identify your homework. Homework is due at the beginning of the class. You will complete some activities from the textbook and I will check them in class. I will not give you credit for your homework after we have covered it in class. Chatting, repeated exits from the classroom, sleeping, and doing other homework, etc. do not show good participation and are disruptive to the class.

Extensive reading- You will be responsible for reading 2 books outside of class weekly. You can find books at the IVC library or the public library and the book selection is your choice. You will complete a book response form which will be turned in as well as give a weekly book presentation in small groups at the beginning of class each week.

Summaries: You will write a short summary of three (3) readings individually: also, in groups in class, you will write three summaries of videos.

Quizzes:/Written Assignments: You will have announced and unannounced quizzes each week based on reading and vocabulary of each chapter. Unit Quiz: You will be tested on reading and vocabulary after each unit. Unit Tests-There will be a unit test every three units. Final Exam: Final exams will be given on the first class meeting during finals week, and the final will be conducted in the same classroom where the class meets during the semester. If an instructor feels that more than one hour is needed to complete the final, he/she can opt to have students meet for a second time during finals week. The final will cover reading and vocabulary from all chapters. There will be no late or make up exams, homework, quizzes, etc. unless you have spoken to me before the due date or testing date

<u>Out of Class Assignments</u>: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time <u>and</u> two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Attendance
