Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course is part of the IVC <u>Inside/Out College Program</u> which brings "Inside" students (those incarcerated at the Imperial County Jail) and "Outside" students (IVC campus students) together for a unique and transformative learning experience. See the Inside/Out College Program website for more information or contact the ICSO Coordinator, Gaylla A. Finnell at <u>gaylla.finnell@imperial.edu</u> or 442-265-2511. All class sessions, except for the first week orientation, will be held at the Imperial County Sheriff's Office at 328 Applestill Road, El Centro, in the Video Visitation Center (VVC). **Orientation for "Outside" students will be on Thursday, August 17th, from 1:00pm-4:10pm at IVC in Room 201.**

<u>Individual Assignment #1</u>: Create a family genogram based on your family. A family genogram consists of a pictorial layout of each partner three generational extended family. It is a tool for both the therapist and family members to understand critical turning points in the family's emotional processes to note dates of births, deaths, marriages and divorces. Create a pictorial layout and write a paper sharing the role that you play in relating with members of your family.

<u>12-step program meeting</u> (1) AA, NA, or Al-Anon: Each student is to attend one 12 step meeting, an AA, NA, or Al-non meeting. Write a 2 to 3 page, typewritten, double space reaction paper sharing your experience of that 12 step meeting, including the history of how the program began. Students must make sure to attend an open meeting.

<u>Individual Assignment #2</u>: Prepare an Addiction Recovery Resource List. More information about this assignment will be given at a later date.

<u>Written Project Paper:</u> Each student would need to pick a theory and do a research on that theory. Paper must be typewritten, double space, etc. More information about this assignment will be given at a later date.

<u>In Class assignments</u>: In class assignments consisting of Q & A worksheets will be given after each chapter.

<u>Group Work</u>: Communication Exercise (Knee to knee): More information about this assignment will be given at a later date.

<u>Quizzes:</u> Quizzes will be given throughout the semester

<u>Exams</u>: Two exams will be given. Exams will consist of multiple choice, and true and false. No make-up exams will be given unless you have called me PRIOR to the exam and let me know that you will not be able to take the exam. If you contact me prior to the exam, you will have one week to make-up the exam. Each exam will be worth 50 points. Please bring a #2 pencil and a Scranton to each examination.

Class participation and Attendance: At the beginning of each class, attendance will be taken (roll call). If a student must arrive late or leave early, the instructor should be notified so that the student is not penalized

unfairly. It is the student's responsibility to let the instructor know when they are in class, particularly if they miss the roll call. Class participation will be measured by presence, active interest and involvement in discussions, exercises and presentations.]

<u>Out of Class Assignments</u>: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time <u>and</u> two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. Attendance
