#### **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

In class instructional method is based on lecture and small group work. Evaluation is based on in class examinations, daily quizzes and nightly reflections. There will be 5 exams (100 points each), final exam (200 points), daily homework quizzes (14, drop 2) and daily reflections you are required to complete on Canvas. The final exam is cumulative.
