### Course Description

This course is an introduction to music literature focusing on listening experience. Students study major forms of music literature, including rich expression of music and music in the Middle Ages, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical and Romantic eras as well as 20th century, jazz, American music, rock and non-Western music.

- This course focuses on the skills and understanding required for a lifetime listening experience. (C-ID MUS 100) (CSU, UC)

### Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Student will learn and use critical listening skills to discuss and critique a musical work. (IL01, IL02, IL04)
2. Student will learn to identify all the instruments in an orchestra by their appearance and their sound. (IL01, IL02, IL04)
3. The Student will learn how identify the “form” of a classical or jazz composition through repeated listening. (IL01, IL02, IL04)
4. Student will know the names of the most important Baroque composers and their most significant compositions. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)

### Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the place of music within human society since prehistory.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of the materials of music (rhythm, melody, harmony, timbre, texture, and smaller forms-motive, phrase, sentence, period, one-part, binary, ternary).

3. Demonstrate knowledge of the larger forms of music (song forms, fugue, rondo, theme and variations, Baroque sonata, sonata-allegro, Classical sonata cycle, concerto, symphony, string quartet, etc.).
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the historical periods of traditional music.
5. Develop skills as an active (as opposed to passive) listener appropriate to the study of music

### Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

**Exams :** There will be three exams(Two Midterm examinations and a final examination). The exams will comprise multiple choice questions.

**The “Famous Composer” Class Presentation :** Each student will choose a composer from the assigned musical era(given by the instructor),and will write a paper(3 pages minimum, double spaced) about the composer’s life and works. The student will also give a 10 to 15 minute presentation of the composer chosen, which will be graded. *(The student has the option to work individually, or in a small group)*

### Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

The final grade will be based on the following percentages:

- 3 Exams : Each Exam (20%) : total 60 % -- The exams will comprise multiple choice questions.
- Presentation : 30%
- Attendance : 10%      Grand total : 100 %

### Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student’s status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. ## Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- **Plagiarism** is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- **Cheating** is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
