Course Description

The course is designed for heritage speakers of Spanish or other linguistically qualified students. The course provides instruction that builds upon the four basic language skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing; placing emphasis on acquiring proficiency using formal Spanish at the intermediate level. The course also focuses on language challenges particular to Heritage and Native speakers such as orthography, the inappropriate mix of English and Spanish, and contrasts between standard Spanish and regional variations. Emphasis will be on the indicative tenses: present, preterit, imperfect, and future. These skills will be explored through reading in the contemporary culture of Spain, Latin America, and the Spanish speaking communities in the United States - Mexican, Cuban, Puerto Rican, and Central American. (CSU) (UC credit limited. See a counselors.)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Spanish speaking fluency, native or near native or 3 years of high school Spanish.

- 1. Research historical and/or cultural information about Spain or a Latin American country and present it orally. (ILO1, ILO3, ILO5)
- 2. Analyze a cultural product (films or texts) from Spain or Latin America. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4, ILO5)
- 3. Differentiate among the indicative and subjunctive moods. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 4. Understand and interpret written and spoken language on a variety of cultural topics and in works of literature and journalism in the target language. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO5)
- 5. Successfully identify and differentiate between verb tenses in the indicative mood. (ILO1, ILO2)

Course Objectives

- 1. Write different types of compositions at the Intermediate-High proficiency level.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the Spanish writing/spelling system with its diacritical marks, especially the accent.
- 3. Comprehend and analyze literary readings from Spain and Latin America.
- 4. Apply the formation and the uses of verb tenses in the indicative mode.
- 5. Name and recognize various cultural and historical events.
- 6. Research, organize and deliver an oral presentation about cultural aspects of a Spanish Speaking

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Exámenes:

Habrá 2 exámenes en clase. Un Midterm y un Examen Final.

Pruebas gramaticales:

El curso incluye varias pruebas gramaticales en Canvas. Las pruebas son a contrarreloj (es decir tienen 10 minutos para terminarlas) y solo podrán tomarlas una vez.

Actividades de práctica:

En los módulos de aprendizaje habrá varias actividades de práctica. Éstas pueden ser prácticas gramaticales o pueden ser preguntas de comprensión sobre lecturas y cortometrajes. Las actividades de práctica de los módulos de gramática usted puede tomarlas hasta en 3 ocasiones. Las actividades de práctica en los módulos de Cultura, Literatura y Lectura y Comprensión sólo tendrá una oportunidad para hacerlas, pero puede pausarlas y regresar a ellas sin problema.

Entrevistas orales:

El estudiante tendrá dos entrevistas con el maestro para evaluar su destreza oral. Estas entrevistas serán calificadas según la corrección al hablar (gramática y ortografía), uso del registro lingüístico formal y la presencia de "Spanglish".

Escritura:

En esta clase hay dos tipos de asignaturas escritas; ¡las llamadas "A Escribir! y los ensayos. Las asignaturas escritas llamadas *A Escribir* tienen un valor de 10 puntos, son semanales y están relacionadas con actividades y lecturas incluidas en los libros. Estas asignaturas (*A Escribir*) se encuentran en los módulos de escritura y deben entregarse cada semana. Una vez que el maestro reciba

el primer borrador le señalará las faltas de ortografía por medio de símbolos de corrección, le asignará una calificación parcial y se la regresará al estudiante quien deberá hacer las correcciones necesarias y regresar la asignatura corregida para la siguiente clase. Si la asignatura no se corrige entones se quedará la calificación parcial que el maestro asignó al primer envío.

IMPORTANTE: Si no se entrega el primer borrador su calificación será "0"

Ensayo o composición escrita:

Habrá tres ensayos a lo largo de la clase. Un ensayo descriptivo, una carta de opinión y un ensayo narrativo. Estos ensayos se entregarán en las fechas determinadas en el calendario. Estos ensayos NO se corregirán, el maestro les asignará una calificación final.

Discusión en clase:

Las discusiones semanales pueden encontrarse en los módulos de aprendizaje. Las discusiones serán sobre temas relacionados con actividades de los textos sobre los cuales los estudiantes tienen que opinar. Por cada tema, los estudiantes tienen que escribir su opinión, mínimo 150 palabras.

Repasos:

El maestro ofrecerá repaso si los estudiantes lo solicitan, antes de los exámenes o en cualquier momento durante el semestre.
