Course Description

English 055: Intensive Composition and Reading Lab

This lab class offers intensive instruction in writing, research, reading, and critical thinking skills to promote success in a concurrent English 110 course. This course allows a qualified student to bypass English 009. This course follows the freshman composition co-requisite model of acceleration. (Nontransferable, non-degree applicable)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Write an expository essay that demonstrates beginning competence in both form and content. The essay will

- 1) address the writing task
- 2) be organized
- 3) use details and examples to support the thesis and
- 4) demonstrate facility with grammar and syntax.

The essay will be supported by the lab work and written according to the guidelines set in the co-requisite English 110 course.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Critically read, analyze, and evaluate a variety of primarily non-fiction texts for content and context.

2. Utilize appropriate pre- and post-reading strategies to analyze patterns of organization within a variety of texts.

3. Write grammatically correct sentences that adhere to conventions of written English.

4. Integrate the ideas of others through paraphrasing, summarizing, and quoting utilizing appropriate MLA format and guidelines.

5. Compose an essay with an introduction, body, and conclusion, which includes organizing an essay around a controlling idea and developing main idea paragraphs with effective use of supporting details.

Textbooks & Other Resources or Links

There are no additional required textbooks beyond those already required for the 110 course.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Class Organization: This class is a lab that will support our English 110 class. It will be an opportunity for you to get more direct feedback from the instructor and your peers on assignments, and to work on issues that otherwise wouldn't be covered in a regular composition course. You should look at this as a support system for your 110 class, and a lot of the time you will get to work with your instructor on whatever elements of the class assignments you wish.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Lab Activities – 50% Essay Check-Ins – 25% Journals – 25%

Failing to participate in assigned class activities can hurt your grade significantly. If you are worried about your grade, I encourage you to contact me throughout the semester.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- <u>Plagiarism</u> is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- <u>Cheating</u> is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file. Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the course and/or disciplinary action. Please refer to the <u>General Catalog</u> for more information on academic dishonesty or other misconduct. Acts of cheating include, but are not limited to, the following: (a) plagiarism; (b) copying or attempting to copy from others during an examination or on an assignment; (c) communicating test information with another person during an examination; (d) allowing others to do an assignment or portion of an assignment; (e) using a commercial term paper service.

Submitting an assignment that you already submitted in another class is another form of cheating. Any such submitted work will receive a zero.
