### **Course Description**

The beginning Spanish course is based on a contrastive an analysis between Spanish and English and is designed to develop in the English-speaking student rudimentary abilities in the four basic language skills: hearing, speaking, reading, and writing. The main emphasis is on the present tense of both regular and irregular verbs. The student will be familiarized with those features of Hispanic culture which reflect the different frame of reference from which the native speaker of Spanish views the world.

### **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Organize information about a historical or cultural aspect of a Spanish-Speaking country for a written or oral assignment. (ILO1, ILO3, ILO5)
- 2. Successfully communicate at the novice/elementary level a personal event in the present tense. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 3. Describe basic daily life situations using correct grammatical structures, vocabulary and idiomatic expressions. (ILO1)
- 4. Assess the content and meaning of written Spanish both orally and in writing. (ILO1, ILO4, ILO5)

### **Course Objectives**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the Spanish sound system.
- 2. Practice receptive skills through coordinated written and spoken material.
- 3. Practice productive skills, by repetition, use of cognates, and real-life situations appropriate to the university level.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of grammar to allow for communication from controlled use of language forms to open-ended communicative activities.
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge of the language skills in speaking, listening, writing, and comprehension according to the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Language Proficiency Guidelines.

### **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

Students are required to read all assigned chapters and participate in classroom activities and discussions. Role playing will allow the student to employ empathetic and active listening skills.

Plan to study 1-2 hours or more a day on your own. It is important when learning a foreign language to practice listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills as much as you can outside of the classroom.

**HOMEWORK**: Submit homework on time. The homework will be assigned every class. No late homework will be accepted unless stapled with a valid medical excuse, within two days of your return. I may check or collect homework on any given day. Neither absence nor tardiness will be considered an excuse for missing assignments, incomplete work, or quizzes. You are responsible for the work missed during your absence.

**WRITTEN COMPOSITIONS / PRESENTATIONS**: You will write several short (a paragraph) compositions and present them to class, throughout the course. Some of these compositions/presentations will be done in-class, while others will be written outside the classroom. The topics; for these compositions will be assigned by the instructor.

**FINAL ORAL INTERVIEW/Presentation:** You will prepare one oral interview. You must be present the day of your interview. The topics will be assigned in class. Interview will be graded on content, preparation, creativity, vocabulary, fluency, pronunciation, and ability to communicate in the target language. Not speaking enough Spanish in interview lowers your grade.

**MITERM EXAM:** The exam will be on Capítulo Preliminar 1- 2 & Ch. 1-2. More information regarding this exam will be given by the instructor

**FINAL EXAM:** The exam will be on Ch. 3-5. More information regarding this exam will be given by the instructor.

CHAPTER EXAMS (EXÁMENES): There will be six chapter exams, a midterm and a final exam. (I will drop the lowest score from tests). If for any reason you miss a test or a quiz (illness, death in the family and etc.), consider this your lowest grade and I will drop it/them). In addition, expect quizzes (written or oral) on grammar, homework assignments, and class discussions on vocabulary, verbs, etc. Quizzes will be announced and unannounced. Please note that the quizzes and the exams would be given in the first hour, don't be late otherwise you will lose time. There will be NO MAKE-UP TESTS OR QUIZZES -Except in cases of documented emergencies, at the discretion of the professor. For reasons of fairness and the integrity of the class, there are NO EXCEPTIONS. Last examinations will be held during the week of June 8th, 2020. You must be present on these days, or you will automatically receive a zero. NO EXCEPTIONS. Make sure you plan on getting to class on time and always come prepared for a quiz.
