Course Description

A continuation of Art 100, extending from the Renaissance to Contemporary times. May be taken before or concurrently with ART 100. Acceptable for credit: CSU, UC.

Course Objectives

- 2. Analyze, discuss, and differentiate works of art and architecture in terms of historical context and cultural values.
- 3. Analyze, discuss, and distinguish the roles of art, architecture, and the artist from the Renaissance to the contemporary period. Differentiate key expressive elements and identify respective era. Apply process of identifying, analyzing and appreciating the visual arts. Through the discussion of current relevant issues, the course also encourages a sense of diversity, social responsibility, and awareness of the occidental perspective found in written history.

Work Based Learning

Work-based learning (WBL) allows students to apply classroom content in professional settings while gaining real-world experiences. These opportunities will provide you with a deeper, more engaging and relevant learning environment. This semester, I will be offering the following WBL activities in order to provide you with the opportunity to explore career options in art history and the humanities.

WBL Activity Name	WBL Activity Description
WBL Activity 1: Museum or art gallery visit	Research and experience based analysis. Students will visit a museum or gallery of choice and write about their experience while engaging in a discussion.
WBL Activity 2: Research-based experiences	Some topics will require extra internet research in order to complete the assignment.
WBL Activity 3: Virtual tour of museum stock room (behind the scenes)	A virtual tour of what occurs behind the scenes in a museum. This will be supplemented with a class discussion.

Some examples of WBL assignments are job shadowing, informational interviews, guest speakers and workplace simulations.

Course Policies

What does it mean to "attend" an online class?

Attendance is critical to student success and for IVC to use federal aid funds. Acceptable indications of attendance are:

- Student submission of an academic assignment
- Student submission of an exam
- Student participation in an instructor-led Zoom conference



- Documented student interaction with class postings, such as an interactive tutorial or computerassisted instruction via modules
- A posting by the student showing the student's participation in an assignment created by the instructor
- A posting by the student in a discussion forum showing the student's participation in an online discussion about academic matters
- An email from the student or other documentation showing that the student has initiated contact with a faculty member to ask a question about an academic subject studied in the course.

Logging onto Canvas alone is NOT adequate to demonstrate academic attendance by the student.

Academic Honesty

- Plagiarism is to take and present as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to correctly 'cite a source', you must ask for help.
